



Where On Earth Is: Katanga

The International Association of the Congo was founded on November 17, 1879 by King Leopold II of Belgium to further his interests in the Congo. The 1885 Berlin Conference recognised the society as sovereign over the territories it controlled. On August 1, 1885, Leopold personally claimed Congo as the "Congo Free State".

Cecil Rhodes' British South Africa Company (BSAC) was also interested in the mineral rights to the Congo Basin's Yeke Kingdom, in Katanga in the south eastern region of the country. Its chief, Msiri, refused to sign a treaty with Rhodes. Leopold II authorised, Canadian, William Grant Stairs to take possession of Katanga. Stairs and his group left Zanzibar on June 27, 1891 and arrived at Bunkeya, Msiri's capital, on December 14, 1891.

On December 19, Stairs realised that Msiri intended to play the Free State and BSAC off against each other. He gave an ultimatum to Msiri to sign a treaty and that he would fly the Free State flag without his consent. Msiri decamped to another stockade. 20 December, Stairs sent a force to capture Msiri, who resisted. Msiri was shot and killed. Stairs backed Mukanda-Bantu to succeed Msiri and forced him to sign a treaty. In January 1892 the treaty convinced the BSAC that the Free State had taken Katanga.

was created on October 28, 1906, in order to exploit the mineral wealth of Katanga.

UMHK was allocated a 20,000 km² concession.

The Union Minière du

Haut Katanga (UMHK)

20,000 km² concession. The main mineral export was copper, followed by cobalt (75% of the world supply in the 1950's), tin, uranium,

radium, gold and diamonds. In 1959, Belgian profits from the UMHK were in excess of 3.5 billion Belgian francs. Export duties paid to the colonial government constituted 50% of its revenue. There were times when the colony's tax on the UMHK accounted for up to 66% of its

revenues. The UMHK also greatly contributed to the wealth of Belgium, as most of the profits were sent to Belgium.

After WW2, Belgium had no plans to grant independence to Belgian Congo, despite UN prodding. Belgium experimented in 1950 by extending civil rights to those évolués, Congolese elite, who were "deserving". By 1955 the scheme had failed. News of independence from French and British colonies spurred political awareness. The inability of Belgium to introduce credible political change caused the évolués to organise themselves politically.

These took two markedly different forms: territorial nationalism, (Belgian Congo would become one politically united state); and ethno-religious/regional nationalism (Belgian Congo would become a federation).

Mouvement National Congolais (MNC), established in 1956 and led by Patrice Lumumba, represented the former.

The Alliance des Bakongo (ABAKO), founded in 1955 led by Joseph Kasa-Vubu, and Confédération des Associations Tribales du Katanga (CONAKAT), founded in 1958 led by Moïse Tshombe, represented the later

In December 1955 the "Thirty Year Plan for the Political Emancipation of Belgian Africa" paper was issued. It was rejected by both Belgium and the évolués. On December 8 and 22, 1957, the colonial government organised the first municipal elections in three urban centres (Léopoldville, Élisabethville and Jadotville), in which Congolese people were allowed to stand for office and cast their vote.

This led to a sudden acceleration in the demands for political emancipation. A key role was played by Lumumba's MNC. On January 4, 1959, a prohibited political demonstration by ABAKO in Léopoldville erupted into extensive rioting.

The violence sent a shockwave through the Congo and Belgium. On January 13, Belgium declared it would work towards the full independence of the Congo.

The Belgian government's plan for a graduated independence was wrecked by the growing violence. The Belgo-Congolese Round Table Conference to discuss independence was held in Brussels, January 20 - February 20 & April 26 - May 16, 1960. It included representatives of the Congolese political parties and chiefs, and Belgian political and business leaders. The conference agreed quickly to grant the Congolese practically all their demands: a general election, held on May 22, 1960; and full independence on June 30.

This was in response to the strong united front put up by the Congolese delegation. The elections produced a split between the centrist MNC and federalist ABAKO. A compromise was

forced through, with Kasa-vubu becoming the first president of the Republic of the Congo, and Lumumba its first head of government








Katanga as part of DR Congo

CONAKAT was concerned that Lumumba would dismiss its members from the Katanga provincial government and replace them with his supporters and nationalise the UMHK. On July 11, Tshombe announced that Katanga was seceding from the Congo. The secession was not supported in northern or southern Katanga. It was primarily to secure the immense mineral wealth. Katanga was home to a disproportionately large Belgian community who openly backed the secession.

On July 14, 1960, the UN Security Council adopted Resolution 143. Belgium was to remove its troops from the Congo and to provide 'military assistance'. It set up the United Nations Operation in the Congo (ONUC). The first UN troops arrived the next day.





There was disagreement between Lumumba and the UN over ONUC's mandate. Lumumba wanted to use ONUC to subdue Katanga by force. UN Secretary-General, Dag Hammarskjöld, refused.

To Hammarskjöld, the secession of Katanga was an internal Congolese matter and the UN was forbidden to intervene. On July 22, Resolution 145 affirmed that Congo should be a unitary state.

August 9, Resolution 146 mentioned Katanga for the first time, and explicitly allowed ONUC to enter Katanga whilst forbidding their use to intervene. ONUC forces entered Élisabethville, the Katanga capital, on August 12, 1960

This frustrated the Congolese government. On August 27, it launched a poorly organized incursion into Katanga. It led to the further deterioration of relations between the two governments. Sporadic clashes would continue for the next two years. On February 21, 1961, resolution 161 was adopted, which authorised use of force as a last resort to stop the civil war.

During the next six months, the UN undertook no major military operations, concentrating instead on facilitating several rounds of political negotiations.

In February 1961, Tshombe hired more foreign mercenaries. The intermittent clashes with the ONUC escalated until April 30 when Tshombe agreed to cease attacks on the ONUC.

Operation Morthor, September 13, 1961, ONUC forces unsuccessfully tried to seize Katanga. Sporadic fighting with ONUC restarted. On September 18, 1961, UN Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld was killed in a plane crash.

U Thant became the new UN Secretary-General. U Thant proposed another peace plan. By December 19 it had failed. In 1962 ONUC and Katanga increased their military strengths. On December 24, 1962, ONUC and Katangese forces clashed near Élisabethville. Over the following days fighting escalated and on December 28, ONUC launched Operation Grandslam to neutralize the Katanga forces.

December 31, 1962, Élisabethville was under UN control. January 15, 1963, Tshombe conceded defeat and on January 21, Kolwezi, his last stronghold fell. Katanga was re-integrated into the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Initial issues for Katanga used overprinted Belgian Congo or Republic of Congo stamps. They had no UPU approval but were tolerated for international postal use.
